"It is extremely difficult to sum up all the good that was Mitchell Horany. All we knew of him was good and it was our God-given privilege to have know him intimately for 20 years." So, before you begin to think my Dad was some saint, remember I said the editor was his best friend and elsewhere in the article he talks about some act of kindness that allowed him to save his newspaper. So consider the source.

In fact, that is what I am asking you to do by reading this. Unfortunately for you, I am the source, not Fr. Bert, Fr. Mike, or anyone else that has the actual ability to be on the Front Page of the Rock Road. I cannot quote Matthew, Mark, Luke or John (sometimes Larry the Cable Guy). I can give you a blank stare on any deep theological subject you care to pick.But what I do understand is the word "Good"!

Now, just because I said I understand the word "good," I am not saying I always accomplish good. If that were even close to the truth I would feel better about writing this. On my Dad's tombstone, are these words: "His Daily Prayer Better Said in Deeds Than Words, Simply Doing Good." Now at least that is something I can strive for.

So, my challenge to the **good** people of St. Peter's while our fearless leader is away comes from Galatians 6:9 "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up."

SUMMER AT ST. PETER'S

During the summer season here at St. Peter's, ministry continues as a response to our Christian vocation "to Know Christ and to Make Him Known." Worship, education and outreach flow from our common life in the Holy Trinity of God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. We tend to focus our lives and attention locally, quite naturally, but my thoughts as I write this piece are drawn beyond our nearest efforts to be Church in the particularities of Kerrville and environs. What the historic Creeds of the Church call "catholic", we know the Gospel of Our Lord is "universal".

I have just listened to a recent (May 12) sermon preached by the Most Rev. Hosam Naoum, Anglican Archbishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem and the Middle East, as he visited Christ Episcopal Church, Greenwich, CT. (View the sermon at <u>afedj.org.</u>) The archbishop is a young man and a good preacher and advocate for our global Communion. Considering the intense pressures of life in his part of the Middle East, the archbishop remains joyfully hopeful that the Resurrected Lord Jesus is still the message by which true peace is practiced and made real wherever He is preached and followed. The gallant, heroic efforts of the people of his geographically enormous diocese are simply miraculous.

When our band of St. Peter's pilgrims made our way to the Holy Land in June of 2022, we worshiped at St. George's Anglican Cathedral in East Jerusalem and celebrated the Day of Pentecost with Archbishop Hosam and our Anglican sisters and brothers gathered there as one body in Christ. Afterwards, we had an audience with the archbishop, a warm and gracious—and brave—soul, whose wide ministry is sorely tried in this time of conflict, of which we can only imagine. I encourage you to go to the website of the American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem (AFEDJ) and learn for yourself (and, perhaps, listen to the archbishop's sermon—and contribute!) what the "Peace of Jerusalem" can look like when Our Lord is proclaimed and embodied in works of mercy, peace and catholic goodwill. You'll be amazed—and humbled. From the place where our Christian faith began to right here in Kerrville, Texas, we share in one Body and one Spirit, one hope, one Lord, one Faith, one Baptism, one God and Father of all.

Meanwhile, let us remember that our beloved St. Peter's depends upon our faithful and generous duties continued locally this summer! Remember, also, Fr. Bert and his family in your prayers during his summer sabbatical!

THE ORGAN RESTORATION with David Miron

The organ at St. Peter's has been not only a source of beautiful music but also a significant piece of our church's history. Nearly 100 years ago, the church acquired a used Hillgreen and Lane organ from Austin, financially possible from the new church fund initiated in 1927. By 1930, the new church building was under construction, and the organ installation was underway. The church was dedicated on December 28, 1930.

In 1956, discussions started with Otto Hofmann of Austin to rebuild the organ, a project completed in 1960 after a year of work. Hofmann retained most of the original components and enhanced the organ with new pipes and mechanical parts, resulting in an organ with two manuals and approximately 18 sets of pipes.

Further enhancements were made in the 1980s by Joe Park of Pipe Creek. He added a threemanual console and expanded the organ to 27 sets of pipes, including those in the back balcony. Around 2000, Robert Borchers updated the control system but made no other significant changes. The two original Hillgreen and Lane Windchests remain: the one in the balcony is in good condition, while the one in the former organ chamber next to the sacristy (adjacent to the current sound booth) requires rebuilding and will not be included in the current refurbishment.

Since 2018, our organist and music director, David Miron, has been overseeing the latest organ rebuild. As the project nears completion, Communications Coordinator, Vereen, had the opportunity to visit the organ room and ask him about the project.

Tell me a little bit about how the organ project started and where we are currently?

In 2018, the organ chamber flooded a foot deep and all the woodwork started to rot. Everything was removed, and the wall to the school playground was sealed by an outside company, and everything was put back in. After I began putting things back together, the 4th Church of Christ, Scientist, in San Antonio closed and gave us their organ. I worked on the removal and storage of their organ, and when that was complete, I was able to put our original organ back together along with using parts from the gifted organ, which has been an ongoing process.

What challenges have you faced during this process?

The original layout of the organ room wasn't well thought out, so the vestry approved building a new framework. The pandemic delayed much of the work. I was doing much of the work in a shared workshop space in San Antonio, but that closed during the pandemic and I moved the work to my house. The space is tighter and makes things a little more difficult.

What has gone well during the project?

The people from our parish have been so supportive. We've had numerous volunteers help with some of the work, and gifts from anonymous donors that have been very appreciated. Having the vestry approve the new framework will make things significantly easier in the long run. And we are getting close to the end of finishing this project!

How is the new organ different from before?

The original organ had 1,700 pipes, and when complete it will have 2,300 pipes. This more complete set will improve the instrument's ability to accompany hymns. Also, the console has been completely remade. Originally it had 3 keyboards, and now it will have 4. The technical installation has made major improvements as well. The control system has parts all made from one company, making connections easier and with less work. Instead of a cable with 500 wires, we now have an updated fiberoptic cable connecting the console to the organ chamber.

What should we look out for in the coming months?

In May, you may have noticed some of the new woodwork and stain. This summer, more pipes will be connected and you'll start to notice a difference in the music, with notes becoming fuller and less high-pitched.

How do you know so much about organs?

When I was 19, I started working for an organ builder. I did that for 20 years, learning from him and occasionally taking on small jobs during that time. After that, I went into church music full time.

As the project nears completion, we are deeply grateful for everyone who has contributed to the organ's restoration. This remarkable instrument, now more powerful and versatile than ever, will soon enhance our worship services with its rich and beautiful sound. We look forward to celebrating its completion and enjoying the lasting impact it will have on our church's music for generations to come.

ST. PETER'S LAUNCHES NEW MINISTRY

To support Schreiner Students



St. Peter's is excited to announce the launch of a new outreach initiative aimed at supporting students at Schreiner University. This new ministry is part of our ongoing commitment to connect with and serve the broader community, starting with the young adults at our neighboring university.

Jenny Ligon, our Family Minister, has been working closely with the College and Young Adult Ministries Director, Tami Woods, developing initiatives to encourage our relationship with the college students living in Kerrville.

In early May, Jenny, along with Lauren Vereen, our Communications Coordinator, made a special visit to Schreiner University during the students' finals week. They brought along snack packs filled with treats to help the students power through their studies. The visit allowed them to explore the campus, including the library and the popular student hangout, the "Lion's Den," where they met several groups of students.

Lauren shared her thoughts on the visit: "We learned a lot on this trip. For one, Friday morning might be a little too early to find studying students. When we returned on a Tuesday afternoon, we found a much busier campus.

Everyone was super friendly and receptive to receiving the snack bags." Jenny Ligon added, "I think some students were surprised to see us, or wondered if accepting a bag meant we expected something from them. But once they realized it was just a pick-me-up with no strings attached, you could tell it really made their day!"

These activities are designed to meet the students where they are, offering practical help and a friendly face during challenging times. We are calling for volunteers from our church to join us in these initiatives. Whether you can spare a few hours on a Tuesday morning, help out during move-in day, or you have some ideas to share, your participation will be crucial in making this ministry a success.

Moreover, the Kerrville Police Department's visits with squad cars help reinforce the message that police officers are trusted helpers in times of need.

Our school also recently hosted a children's author in the library, who read to the Kindergarten class, enhancing literacy and fostering a love for reading. As Janet Boutin, our school director shared, "For our young students, the advantages of special visitors to school teach life lessons in a more hands-on, immersive fashion and within the comfort of our campus. These are the types of lessons our students remember for many years to come." Indeed, these experiences enrich our curriculum, deepen community connections, and provide memorable learning experiences that our students carry forward into their lives.









St. Peter's Launches Pete's Packs Ministry

We are excited to introduce a new ministry at St. Peter's, born out of a moment of need that inspired an idea. Occasionally, we encounter individuals who stop by our office seeking assistance. While we already offer vouchers for gas and bills, a few months ago, we were caught off guard when a homeless man stopped by asking if we had anything to give him. This encounter inspired us to create "Pete's Packs."

Pete's Packs are discreet brown paper bags containing essential hygiene products and other commonly needed items. Each pack will include a toothbrush and toothpaste, deodorant, socks, underwear, and other essentials. These packs are intended to provide immediate relief and a sense of dignity to those in need who come to us for help.

To ensure we are offering the most useful items, our Communications Coordinator, Lauren Vereen, reached out to the Men's Homeless Center run by the Salvation Army and Christian Assistance Ministries (CAM). Their valuable advice has helped us curate the contents of Pete's Packs to best serve the needs of those experiencing homelessness.

Since St. Peter's does not have a food pantry or shelter, each pack will include a reference card with information on local resources where individuals can find additional help. This initiative is not just about providing immediate relief but also about connecting people with long-term support.

Pete's Packs will be distributed discretely, and only as needed. We acknowledge it is rare that we have those from the homeless community stop by our offices, but in those instances we would love to be prepared to send them on with compassion and kindness. We hope as this ministry grows, parishioners can also keep a pack in their vehicle, to distribute if the need arises.

As a community, we at St. Peter's are deeply blessed. Many of us have not experienced the hardship of homelessness, but it is crucial to recognize and consider this population in Kerrville. Homelessness remains a pressing issue in Texas, with the overall rate continuing to trend upward in recent years. This increase may be attributed to a lack of affordable housing and soaring rent prices, which are consistent with nationwide data trends (Texas Homeless Network).

Pete's Packs is a small yet significant step in showing compassion and care to those who are less fortunate. We invite you to join us in this new ministry. 

AN UPDATE FROM THE TASK FORCE




The Community of Saints Francis and Clare (CSFC) is on track to begin our first cohort in the fall of 2025!

We plan to hire a coordinator for the program after Father Bert returns from his sabbatical. This person will facilitate the participant application process and develop the program in consultation with the programs at St. Anselm's in London and Community at the Crossing in New York City.

The CSFC task force is exploring avenues for parish involvement including a rotating monthly group of "houseparents" to assist in the everyday life and health of our participants. We are also in the planning stages of various committees to search for participants, find retreat and speaker opportunities, and involve our participants in the prayer and service life of our church.

In addition to receiving several generous donations from interested parties, we are working with a Diocese of West Texas grant writer to seek additional funding sources. Our ultimate goal is to offer scholarships to all participants who need them. We will continue to pursue other funding opportunities.

What can you do for St. Peter's?

Consider a gift to The Rock of St. Peter's!

You may know that the Rock of St. Peter's (the Rock) is an endowment fund. The money is managed Episcopal Church by the Foundation's representative in the Diocese of West Texas with financial advice from Frost Bank. The St. Peter's Endowment Commission. in conjunction with the Vestry, oversees the Rock. That means we help determine how it invested, how much of it is spent, and help the parish understand how it operates. We determine how much of it is spent by recommending the percentage of the fund that is spent each year. Our current recommended spend rate is 4%. A four percent spend rate is well below the growth rate of our investments so the Rock will not be depleted but will continue to grow into the future.

The Rock represents the future for our Parish. It provides financial stability, steady income to the parish for church needs and ministries as well as a significant reserve for emergencies. Obviously the bigger the Rock, the more funds available to the Parish each year for growth, outreach and other needs that may arise.

What you may not know, is there are a variety of funds within the Rock designated to specific needs or causes in the Parish. When you make a gift to the Rock, you can designate which fund you wish your contribution to go. Some of the funds and their designations are listed below.

- · St. Peter's School
- Burney Music Fund-can be used solely in support of our music programs
- Labyrinth Fund
- McCaskill Scholarship Fund providing scholarships to St. Peter's students.
- The MacDonald Family Endowment related to our apartment building.
- Maintenance Fund-to be used solely for maintenance of Church and grounds
- Get With it Fund-to be used as needed in the Parish at the discretion of the Vestry. This is the most flexible fund in the Rock-very few restrictions.


